

The Faculty of Law at the University of British Columbia seeks applicants for a position as a Full Time Lecturer focusing on Korean Legal Studies for the 2010-11 academic year. This is a term appointment. The successful applicant will teach courses focused on aspects of Korean Legal Studies in coordination with our Centre for Asian Legal Studies, will serve as the Director of our Korean Legal Studies Program, and will undertake other teaching or administrative duties as required.

UBC's Faculty of Law, as one of the largest law schools in Canada, offers a varied program of instruction in a broad array of legal fields to a diverse group of law students. Our faculty members encourage students to develop creative and effective approaches to legal analysis and problem solving. Because of the specialized nature of this position, applicants must meet the following requirements to be qualified for consideration for the appointment:

- The candidate should have an excellent academic record including law school training in Korea and North America. More specifically, the candidate must hold one law degree from a leading school in Korea and one from a leading school in a common law jurisdiction.
- A graduate degree at the doctoral level is strongly preferred.
- The candidate must have fluent oral and written Korean language skills, including a command of specialized legal language. The candidate must have excellent English language skills, both oral and written. The candidate's fluency in Korean and English in both oral and written communication must be at the level necessary to teach courses.
- The candidate must have teaching experience at a common law (North American) law school as well as knowledge about the similarities and differences between legal education in Korea and North America.

Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE: Applicants for this term appointment should submit a cover letter providing information about their qualifications, keeping in mind the special requirements noted above, a curriculum vitae, the names of three referees, and a summary of teaching evaluations by June 22, 2010.
